Paper 1: Shakespeare [Macbeth] and the 19th-century novel [A Christmas Carol]

Written exam: 1 hour 45 minutes

Section A Shakespeare: students will answer one essay question on Macbeth. They will be required to write in detail about an extract from the play and then to link to the play as a whole.

Section B The 19th-century novel: students will answer one question on A Christmas Carol. They will be required to write in detail about an extract from the novella and then link to the novella as a whole. The exams will measure how students have achieved the following assessment objectives. **These are covered by the writing frames and criteria which your teachers have taught you PETAL / PEEL / What, How, Why.**

 maintain a critical style and develop an informed personal response, use textual references, including
 quotations, to support and illustrate interpretations. (What + Where)

- Explain what this theme is/means
- Explain where it is seen in the play
- Recall relevant quotations to this theme
- Explain why the writer has used this theme

Essay planning and writing:

- Annotate the extract
- o Plan 2 key moments from the text, plus the extract
- o Begin with a thesis statement outlining your argument
- o Use What, Where, How, Why analysis paragraph structure
